Dear Governor Moore, Lieutenant Governor Miller, President Ferguson, Speaker Jones, and the Maryland General Assembly:

In accordance with Executive Order 01.01.2024.29, we are pleased to submit the Annual Report and Action Plan Update of the Maryland 250 Commission for calendar year 2025.

The Commission is charged with developing, encouraging, and executing an inclusive statewide observance of the 250th anniversary of the founding of our nation, guided by a focus on three overarching themes - history, civics, and service. As the U.S. Semiquincentennial is a national commemoration with state and local execution, Maryland is one of 50 U.S. states and 6 U.S. territories which have launched 250 commissions. In addition to Maryland's statewide commission, local and regional 250 commissions have formed in all but three Maryland counties.

Throughout 2025, the Commission was active in building new partnerships, undertaking projects showcasing Maryland's unique role in the journey from 1776 to today, and planning for commemorative events that will launch in 2026. Activities included:

- Completion of the Citizen Academy, Inclusive History, and MD Two Fifty Fellows small grant programs, resulting in grants awarded in every Maryland county with 174 grants totaling more than \$750,000.
- Launch of the MD Two Fifty "Once in a Generation" grant program, to support local 250 Commissions in developing memorable and unique commemorative activities for the 250th.
- Creation of the MD Two Fifty Revolutionary Baseball initiative and partnership with the six minor league teams throughout Maryland.
- Undertaking a campaign with the Maryland State Ad Agency, resulting in an award-winning [video](#) boosting awareness of the 250th in Maryland.
- Convening of networks and new stakeholder groups including the launch of a fourth working group focused on African American Heritage, and planning and hosting convenings with leaders of African American museums and cultural centers, the Maryland Mosaic partner network, historical societies throughout Maryland, eastern shore 250 Commission leaders, and with local 250 Commission leaders statewide which will be a recurring meeting through 2026.
- Planning for key 2026 initiatives including the MD Two Fifty Civics Moonshot, a Freedom of the Press project, and partnerships for the Maryland 400 remembrance events in Brooklyn, New York, and the Black Revolutionary War Soldiers Monument unveiling on the grounds of the Maryland State House.

- A daylong in-person symposium on planning for the 250th in Maryland in May, attended by more than 100 stakeholders, and additional stakeholder support via monthly newsletters, statewide virtual convenings, and monthly virtual office hours.
- Support of national initiatives including America's Field Trip, America's Potluck, America's Tapestry, Ken Burns "American Revolution" PBS series, US Military 250, Sail250, Sharing the Spirit of America, Two Lights for Tomorrow, and 200 Years of American Rail.
- Tabling at major statewide events including the Maryland Municipal League and Maryland Association of Counties conferences, the Maryland Folk Festival, and at local events.
- Hosting three in-person Commission meetings in Accokeek, Cambridge, and Hagerstown, five virtual Commission meetings, and nine meetings of working groups and committees.
- Hiring three new contractual employees, including two from the Department of Service and Civic Innovation Service Year Option program.

We thank all who have contributed to our progress this year including Governor Wes Moore, Lt. Governor Aruna Miller, Secretary Rebecca Flora, AICP, of the Department of Planning, MD Two Fifty Commissioners, MD Two Fifty staff, and the staff of the Maryland Historical Trust. We also thank two former Secretaries who served as Commissioners, D. Paul Monteiro, Jr., and Anthony Woods, for their many contributions.

The MD Two Fifty Commission is fully committed to our work in 2026 and to creating our legacy in 2027. We thank you for your past and future support.

1. BACKGROUND

In 2016, the United States Congress established the U.S. Semiquincentennial Commission to plan the 250th anniversary of the founding of the United States and to coordinate this commemoration with the states, particularly the thirteen original colonies. State Semiquincentennial Commissions began to launch soon after, and on January 24, 2021, former Governor Larry J. Hogan, Jr. issued an Executive Order authorizing the creation of the Maryland Semiquincentennial Commission.

On July 3, 2023, Governor Wes Moore rescinded the 2021 Executive Order, authorizing creation of a “Maryland 250 Commission” charged with planning commemorative activities around the three organizing themes of history, civics, and service. Governor Moore appointed former Governor Parris N. Glendening to serve as Commission Chair and Judge Catherine Curran (Katie) O’Malley as Vice Chair. The reconstituted Commission held its first meeting on December 4, 2023, with subsequent meetings on April 16, 2024, August 28, 2024, and November 12, 2024. The Executive Order was revised again on September 4, 2024, with the addition of a Commission seat for the Adjutant General of Maryland; the revised Executive Order can be found on the Commission’s website at <https://mdtwofifty.maryland.gov/>.

2. MISSION, GOALS, AND VISION

The mission of the Maryland 250 Commission is to develop, encourage, and execute an inclusive statewide observance of the 250th anniversary of the founding of the nation recognizing all Marylanders' struggle for life, liberty, and the pursuit of happiness, before, during, and after the Revolution, based on three themes – history, civics, and service.

The goals are to:

- Invite broad-based public input on the meaning, significance, and opportunities of this anniversary that will inform development of commemoration activities, programs, and events.
- Acknowledge that the confiscation of Indigenous land and displacement of Indigenous people is central to the United States' origin story and recognize the persistence and contributions of these communities today.
- Honor the legacy of both free and enslaved African Americans in the making of Maryland and the nation, whose untold stories of heroism and perseverance are critical to the understanding of our shared past and present.
- Support the identification and enhancement of cultural assets that tell the story of who we are as Marylanders and promote place-based visitor experiences for residents and visitors alike.
- Engage youth, new Americans, and lifelong learners in programs designed to encourage the search for meaning behind America and deepen engagement in civic life.
- Celebrate service to the country and community, and create opportunities that promote social responsibility, compassion and understanding that will unite and strengthen Maryland's diverse communities for the benefit of all.

The Commission vision as adopted on August 28, 2024, is:

MD Two Fifty envisions an inclusive and nonpartisan statewide reflection on our past that honors the contribution of all Marylanders, that unites us in purpose to serve, to engage civically, and to shape the future of our state and nation for the next generation.

3. COMMISSION COMPOSITION, STAFFING, FUNDING, AND OFFICE

The Commission is led by The Honorable Parris N. Glendening, Chair, and The Honorable Catherine Curran (Katie) O’Malley, Vice Chair. Their leadership has been instrumental in moving the work of the Commission forward. There are 34 seats on the Commission, and in 2025 several seats changed representation. A complete list of Commissioners can be found in Appendix 1 of this report.

The Commission is staffed by Michele W. Johnson, Director, since April 2023. Erin Bode was hired as an intern in June 2023 and named Assistant Administrator in January 2024. Programs and Partnerships Specialist Mary Zell Galen joined the team in July 2025. The work of the Commission has been supported annually by two professionals from the Department of Service and Civic Innovation’s (DSCI) Maryland Corps and Service Year Option programs. These innovative programs promote Governor Moore’s commitment to promoting service to the community, one of the Commission’s three themes. The Commission entered into a partnership with DSCI in September 2024, hiring Travis Clatterbuck (Maryland Corps) and Rinnari Smail (Service Year Option Member) who served as Outreach Specialists through June 2025. A new partnership with DSCI in September 2025 resulted in the hiring of Angela Rush (Service Year Option Member) and Parys Wyatt (Maryland Corps), both Outreach Specialists, through June 2026.

Funds appropriated to support the Commission are included in the budget of the Maryland Department of Planning which is tasked by the Executive Order to provide the Commission with resources and staff necessary for administering and facilitating its work. The Commission’s offices are located at 100 Community Place in Crownsville, Maryland.

4. COMMISSION STRUCTURE AND MEETINGS

COMMISSION STRUCTURE

As set forth in the Executive Order, the Commission is required to adopt administrative and financial procedures for the transaction of business, including, but not limited to, the establishment of advisory groups, committees, or working groups that address the themes of history, service, and civics. Bylaws, posted on the Commission website, were adopted by the Commission at its first meeting in December 2023. These bylaws describe the role of the Chair in appointing Committee members and rules for how these Committee and working groups are to conduct business.

Currently, four standing working groups support the Commission's themes and priorities and guide the work of the Commission:

- The African American Heritage Working Group is co-chaired by Terri Lee Freeman, President of the Reginald F. Lewis Museum of Maryland African American History and Culture, and Chanel C. Johnson, Executive Director of the Maryland Commission on African American History and Culture and the Banneker-Douglass-Tubman Museum.
- The Civics Working Group is chaired by Dr. Antonio Ugues, Jr., Associate Professor of Political Science and Department Chair at St. Mary's College of Maryland.
- The History Working Group is chaired by Katie Caljean, President and CEO of the Maryland Center for History and Culture.
- The Service Working Group was chaired by Paul D. Monteiro, former Secretary of the Maryland Department of Service and Civic Innovation, through November 11, 2025. Geri Byrd, Chief of Staff to Lieutenant Governor Aruna Miller, was appointed working group Chair effective November 18, 2025.

There are also two committees:

- An Executive Committee, authorized by the bylaws to act on behalf of the Commission when such action is required prior to the next scheduled meeting of the Commission, or when a quorum of the Commission cannot be formed. This committee is composed of the Chair and Vice Chair, the working group chairs, and the co-chairs of the Communications, Fundraising, and Events Committee.
- A Communications, Fundraising, and Events Committee, co-chaired by Robin V. Sproul, Executive Vice President of Javelin Communications, and Steve Kearney, Founding Partner of KO. This Committee plays a critical role in planning, partnerships, and seeking to leverage non-state resources to support signature and legacy MD Two Fifty programs and events.

COMMISSION MEETINGS

The Executive Order requires the Commission to meet a minimum of twice per year, however with the approach of the 2026 anniversary year, Commission meetings have increased in frequency. The Commission held three in-person meetings in 2025 – on April 24 in Cambridge, on August 28 in Hagerstown, and on November 18 in Accokeek - and five virtual meetings on January 27, June 26, July 31, September 29, October 27, to approve new grants and initiatives.

WORKING GROUP MEETINGS

AFRICAN AMERICAN HERITAGE WORKING GROUP

The African American Heritage Working Group's primary focus in 2025 was to build a connected statewide network of leaders of African American museums and cultural centers, and to build awareness of the 250th and available resources. The Working Group met on October 10 and hosted two well attended virtual meetings with stakeholders on June 9 and November 13.

CIVICS WORKING GROUP

The Civics Working Group's primary focus in 2025 was to review and recommend Citizen Academy grant applications to the Commission. Most voting occurred via email, however, the Working Group met jointly with the Communications, Fundraising, and Events Committee on August 20, 2025, to review and vote on Citizen Academy grant applications and to review two proposals – the MD Two Fifty Civics Moonshot and a Freedom of the Press project. The joint vote supported recommending both projects to the Commission, who voted in support of the proposals at their August 28, 2025, meeting.

A total of 29 Citizen Academy grant applications were received in 2025 of which 24 met eligibility guidelines. With the approval of 24 new Citizen Academy grant applications in 2025, the number of Citizen Academy grants funded by the Commission totaled 28 grants in 15 counties. A complete list of Citizen Academy grants awarded can be found in Appendix 2.

HISTORY WORKING GROUP

The History Working Group's primary focus in 2025 was to review and recommend Inclusive History grant applications to the Commission. The Working Group met on January 24, April 17, August 12, and November 7 to consider these applications and new partnership opportunities. A total of 95 grant applications were received in 2025 of which 64 were recommended to the Commission for approval. With the approval of these new Inclusive History grant applications in 2025, the total number of Inclusive History grants funded by the Commission was 97 grants in all but two Maryland counties. A complete list of Inclusive History grants awarded can be found in Appendix 2.

In 2025, the History Working Group also reviewed and voted to recommend to the Commission support of partnerships and co-sponsorships including America's Tapestry; a monument at the State House grounds honoring Black Revolutionary War Patriots; a statewide Liberty Tree project; and remembrance events in Brooklyn, New York honoring the 250th anniversary of the Maryland 400 in the Battle of Brooklyn.

SERVICE WORKING GROUP

The Service Working Group's primary focus in 2025 was to review and recommend MD Two Fifty Fellows grant applications to the Commission. The Working Group conducted all votes via email and no meetings were held. A total of 50 grant applications were received in 2025 of which 43 were recommended to the Commission for approval. With the approval of these new MD Two Fifty Fellows grant applications in 2025, the number of MD Two Fifty Fellows grants funded by the Commission totaled 51 grants in 19 Maryland counties. A complete list of MD Two Fifty Fellows grants awarded can be found in Appendix 2.

In 2025, this working group also focused on tracking events commemorating the 250th anniversary of the U.S. Military, specifically the Army, Marines, and Navy.

COMMUNICATIONS, FUNDRAISING, AND EVENTS COMMITTEE

The Communications, Fundraising, and Events Committee held five virtual meetings in 2025: on January 23, April 11, August 20 (joint meeting with the Civics Working Group), October 9, and November 10. Seventeen new initiatives, partnerships, or co-sponsorships were recommended by the committee and approved by the Commission in 2025:

The goal of this grant program is to support inclusive, community-centered research, events, programs, projects, and exhibits.</p> <p>Funded projects tell a diverse and inclusive story about America's past that invites participation from all Marylanders; encourage reflection on the ongoing evolution of American democracy, Maryland's integral role in that process, and the impact of Marylanders on the nation's past, present, and future; and demonstrate how understanding the complexity of our history helps us to respond to the present and prepare for the future.</p> <p>This program is tied to the Executive Order themes "to acknowledge that the confiscation of Indigenous land and displacement of Indigenous people is central to the United States' origin story and recognize the persistence and contributions of these communities today"; "honor the legacy of both free and enslaved African Americans in the making of Maryland and the nation, whose untold stories of heroism and perseverance are critical to the understanding of our shared past and present"; and "to support the identification and enhancement of cultural assets that tell the story of who we are as Marylanders and promote place-based visitor experiences for residents and visitors alike".</p>

6. ACCOMPLISHMENTS IN 2025

MD TWO FIFTY SMALL GRANTS PROGRAM

The Citizen Academy, Inclusive History, and MD Two Fifty Fellows small grant programs are now complete, with grants awarded in every Maryland county, and 174 grants totaling more than \$750,000. A list of grants awarded can be found in Appendix 2 of this report.

MD TWO FIFTY “ONCE IN A GENERATION” GRANT PROGRAM

The MD Two Fifty “Once in a Generation” grant program launched in November 2025, to support counties participating in local and regional 250 Commissions and committees in developing memorable and unique commemorative activities. Up to 24 grants will be available, each up to \$15,000, with a limit of one grant per county, maximum funding awarded \$360,000.

LOCAL AND REGIONAL 250 COMMISSIONS

Local participation is a priority of the Commission and communities statewide are encouraged to launch a local commission. At the time this report was submitted, local or regional 250th commissions or committees have launched in all but three Maryland counties (Caroline, Cecil, and Montgomery). The Commission tracks and posts local commissions on the “Get Involved” page of the website and offers assistance including information, grant funding, marketing support, and statewide networking opportunities.

Some communities and institutions in Maryland have milestone anniversaries in 2025 and 2026, and efforts are being made to track, co-brand, and partner when possible. Examples: Anne Arundel County (375th in 2025); Church Hill (150th in 2026); Deep Creek Lake (100th in 2025); Greensboro (200th in 2026); John Hopkins University (150th in 2026); Maryland Institute College of Art (200th in 2025); Montgomery County (250th in 2026); Ocean City (150th in 2025); Salisbury University (100th in 2025); Talbot County (365th in 2026); University of Baltimore (100th in 2025); and Washington County (250th in 2026).

The Maryland Society, Sons of the American Revolution, and the Maryland State Society, Daughters of the American Revolution also have active 250th committees.

PROMOTIONAL VIDEO

The Commission entered into a contract with the Maryland State Ad Agency to produce a promotional video (30 second- and 2-minute versions) and for advertising services. The video launched on August 1, 2025, and was shown at every home game at all six minor league ballparks in Maryland, at the Maryland State Fair and county agricultural fairs, on Maryland Public Television and on the Mid-Atlantic Sports Network (MASN), and on streaming and social media platforms. On October 8, the video won a platinum award at the American Marketing Association MX Awards event in Baltimore.

STAKEHOLDER SUPPORT

In addition to grant funding, support to stakeholders includes information, assistance, marketing support, and co-sponsorships:

- An in-person statewide symposium on planning for the 250th in Maryland was held in Crownsville on May 5, 2025, and attended by more than 100 stakeholders from throughout Maryland.
- Seven statewide virtual convenings with a guest speaker, announcements, and updates from around the state, on January 22, March 5, April 16, May 28, July 21, October 1, and November 12.

- Fourteen statewide virtual office hours were held, where stakeholders discuss ideas, requests, and questions with staff, on January 31, February 26, March 27, April 25, May 30, June 27, July 1, July 10, July 31, August 22, September 25, October 30, November 20, and December 18.

- The Commission offers customized partner logos, co-branding, co-sponsoring, and promotion of events, places, and stories via the website, social media, and monthly newsletter.

OUTREACH

The 250th is a national commemoration with state and local execution, and the focus of the Maryland 250 Commission is on the entire state of Maryland. Outreach to local communities and stakeholders, and building relationships and partnerships, are vital to the success of the Commission. Outreach is done via presentations, tabling at major conferences and events, virtual and in-person meetings, and visits to local communities statewide to meet stakeholders and learn about their communities. **Every county and Baltimore City has been visited by the Commission Director since 2023.**
